

Art Exhibit

The Stoneham Public Library is delighted to once again welcome artists M.E. Drummey and Sandy Kirby to exhibit their lovely artwork.



M.E. Drummey paints her lovely artwork with a passion for watercolor that began in 2000 when this artist attended a watercolor workshop offered by the Stoneham Senior Center. She has continued painting lovely scenes ever since. From the beginning of her artistic endeavors, M.E. Drummey has enjoyed numerous opportunities to exhibit her beautiful paintings in a wide array of settings. A painting of this artist's lilacs was featured in Boston's Arnold Arboretum's *Lilac Sunday*. A Christmas ornament of her design adorned the White House Christmas tree in the Blue Room. M.E. Drummey has painted Iron Rangers in Salisbury and Saugus for the Massachusetts Department of Conservation. She has also exhibited at the State House in Boston, Stoneham

and Melrose Libraries, the Beebe Estate in Melrose and StonehamBank. Her artwork has been part of a rotating exhibit displayed at Stoneham's Town Hall. Most recently the artist has been involved in the *Stoneham Switch-Box Art Program*. M.E. Drummey has painted these boxes to generously donate her talents to this public art project. M.E.

Drummey states, "my love for nature and animals brings me such peace that I find, I enjoy painting them the most." M.E. Drummey is a member of the Porter Art Group and the Peabody Art Association.

Sandy Kirby's exhibit features a lovely display of subjects portrayed in oils, watercolors, ink and acrylics. The artist began painting in Stoneham a few years ago when she was introduced to local artist, Howard Porter. Mr. Porter had formed the "Porter Art Group" meeting at the Stoneham Senior Center. The artist continues to enjoy membership in this group. She also belongs to the Peabody Art & Reading Art Associations. Sandy Kirby finds joy in the creative feeling that her beautiful painting inspires. She also



enjoys the relaxation that her artistic pursuits give her. She paints regularly each Saturday morning in Wakefield with a group of local artists. The medium this artist first chose was watercolor. Since then oils and acrylics have been part of her repertoire. Each medium is different and the artist finds pleasure with all of them. Sandy Kirby has participated in numerous area art shows at which she has been the recipient of ribbons and honors.
