Members should bring pencils, pens, notebooks, loose-leaf paper and/or a laptop for brainstorming and taking notes.






Project: Home




MAY BOOK CHALLENGE


required). You can either print this pass reservation from your email or display the reservation confirmation on your device to admissions. The pass is valid only for the reserved visiting date.

good read. One of my favorite literary prize lists is **The International Booker Prize**. I enjoy reading about the authors, as well as the stories from all over the world, which are quite interesting.


This year, I came across a new literary prize which I found to

Sunset Pass | Zane Grey

Review | Matthew Sowyrda

Zane Grey takes us on a horseback ride into the American West in this novel. He evokes the region's natural beauty – the flora and fauna, the peaceful solitude of the faraway hills, and the refulgent Texan sunsets that come and go over the Pass. At the center of



the story, we see Zane's version of the cowboy: one that has – amid the usual shortcomings of a regrettable past – the nobility of Jack Schaefer's angelic gunslinger, and the sagacity of Sergio Leone's Machiavellian lone rider.

After six years of wandering about in the mid-West, seasoned Trueman cowboy Rock returns his hometown of to Wagontongue, Texas. He falls for the daughter of a ranchowner who has recently established his cattle herding business out in the secluded corner of Sunset Pass. As Trueman continues to work for the rancher, he finds himself entangled in a web of illegal activity involving the rancher's eldest son, and the young woman's brother. Trueman's inclination to expose the crime at hand conflicts with his love for the young woman and the rest of her family's interests. True to his name, Trueman wants to do what is right, but hesitates because of the jeopardy that it might cause to his love and the family's integrity. With the wise counsel from old friends, Rock moves closer to the decisive moment in which justice is to be served.
