
#### Mysteries Around the World Book Group September 7th at 7 pm | The Stoneham Room




# Movie Matinee: *Dazed and Confused*September 15th at 1 pm | The Marcy Room

Join us as local poet Peter Crowley talks about his upcoming books *Empire's End* and *That Night and Other Stories*, both due out in mid-October. *That Night and Other Stories* covers a range of topics and styles, including the surreal ("Connected"), straight-forward ("That Night") and symbolism ("Home, At Last"). While some of the stories have simple themes such as a couple's fight ("Somewhere else") and late adolescent love ("First Love"), others depict social justice-related themes like "Accost," "That Night" and "Crusade, or Historic Other." *Empire's End* has a bitter, rebellious and cynical theme running across it, as it was largely written during the Covid pandemic, and some just before, when Crowley was struggling at his current place of employment for a fair salary. # The Case of the Missing Library Book! Recommendation | Melissa Jackson

It has been going on all summer! I have been watching the books disappear week after week and I can't quite figure it out – but I love it! *The Boxcar Children* mysteries have been flying off the shelves faster than I can say "This sounds like an adventure!" What is behind this mysterious resurgence in popularity? Actually, there was never a mystery to begin with; the *Boxcar Children* have been a beloved series since Gertrude Chandler Warner first wrote about them in 1924!

At 99 years old, Warner stopped writing in the 1970's about the adventures of the Aldren children – Henry, Jessie, Violet and Bennie – who, after their parents die, run away from their relatives who plan to split the family up and find a boxcar to live in. They find friendship and employment with a local doctor, and eventually are reunited with their grandfather (I mean, who is going to let four kids live in a boxcar forever?). Their grandfather has the boxcar delivered to his home so that the children can keep it as a playhouse. The Aldren children continue their adventures around town and on many trips their grandfather tags along.

These lovely books are defying the odds of their genre and staying on the shelves, continuing to delight children with their adventures. *Publishers Weekly* noted: "One of the most interesting things about the books is that they're not terribly action-packed, like what you'd expect in a modern adventure story. They're more like quiet observations of the Aldens going about their daily lives and taking care of one another. But it's also what has given them such longevity." I asked one of our young patrons who is reading these tales voraciously what he liked about the *Boxcar Children*. He said that they were fun, but not too scary. I think my young friend speaks to the appeal of these lightweight capers. The stories are fun, and the readers, usually grades 2-4, are happily comforted by the knowledge that they have an adventure but will not be too scared.

Multiple families are clamoring for the tales, and the kids are eating them up. With 160 (!!) books in the series at this count, that sounds like a series with adventure written all over it.



#### All About Writing

#### Recommendation | Matthew Sowyrda



I have decided to discuss this topic after several meetings of the writing program that I began in May. In this post I intend to garner interest for the program, as well as provide resources to those who might be starting to – or struggling with – creative writing and are looking for advice. My own (largely informal) experience spans from childhood through college, having composed prose and poetry both inside and outside of school. I continue to write in my leisure – though, I admit, not as much as I had written during my school days.

Now, the program is not a "class," for - like Socrates - I am no teacher; at least not by profession. I facilitate activities to entertain the more "casual" participants and challenge those who have loftier goals, initiate discussion, and share excerpts from authors I enjoy, as I try to cover the four "divisions" of creative writing: novels, short stories, poetry, and essays. Furthermore, I welcome participants to bring their favorite authors to the table (so to speak), because exposure to different styles can improve one's writing skills. For I am inclined to agree with Aristotle, who said that much of our lives are spent imitating others, especially in art (*Poetics*, chs. 2, 4). As writers, we tend to "borrow" - perhaps more subconsciously than consciously - from those whom we read most often. In short, our reading informs our writing.

Since April, I have been reading through numerous titles on the subject in an attempt to gather the best points that have been said about creative writing. You will find in this list that I have compiled that there are different angles from which to tackle the process. These books talk about good writing habits, dissecting poems, outlining stories, and literary elements, among other matters. Also included are the "classics" of literary theory, most notably the *Poetics* of Aristotle and the *Ars Poetica* of Horace. In the former, the Philosopher lays down standards for devices like plot structure and characterization. In the latter, the Poet praises traditional approaches to composition, as well as instructs the writer to wait several years before publishing freshly written work, so that time can age it well (II. 387–391).

In addition to print materials, I recommend these online sources: <u>PoetryFoundation.org</u>, for all things poetical; <u>Poets&Writers.org</u>, for a directory of literary magazines that you can submit to (see guidelines) and a wealth of information about publishing; and <u>WritersDigest.org</u>, for articles about technique, prompts, genres, and more; the company also publishes books similar to many of those that are featured in the reading list above.

# Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum Review | Ali Fletcher

On days when the summer sun is either too strong or too obstructed by dreary, gray storm clouds to enjoy a day outdoors, there are few places better to while away the hours than the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum. Located in the Fenway neighborhood of Boston, the ISGM is well-equipped to capture the attention of plant lovers, art enthusiasts, and history buffs alike. Stoneham Library Patrons can explore the expertly curated world of Isabella Stewart Gardner's collections by using their library card to reserve passes that admit four adults for \$5 each, and children under the age of 18 for free.



For plant parents and aspiring botanists, the temporary exhibitions are currently showcasing *Presence of Plants in Contemporary Art*, a collection of living displays and videography from artists such as Zheng Bo of Taiwan, artist-activists Heather Ackroyd and Dan Harvey of the UK, and Australian environmentalist Natalie Jeremijenko. In the museum's courtyard lies the central botanical garden (pictured) where visitors can immerse themselves in Gardner's love of horticulture as a living art. For those interested in classical art, the three floors of galleries circling the courtyard display countless works by artists such as Degas and Matisse, Gardner's personal collection of Dante's *Divine Comedy*, intricate 18th century furniture and 16th century tapestries, and copies of correspondence between Gardner and John Singer Sargent, Benjamin Franklin, and Victor Hugo, among other notable figures. Each room was personally arranged by Gardner and stands exactly the same as it had prior to her death, allowing visitors to ensconce themselves in the rich and luxurious visions that Gardner had spent her life bringing into reality.

Despite its vast collection of precious relics and masterpieces, the Museum is perhaps most famous for being the target of the largest art heist and property theft that history has ever known. For audiences more interested in the seedy underbelly of Boston history, one can visit the ISGM to learn more about how, in March of 1990, two men disguised as police officers managed to break into the museum under the cover of night and steal thirteen priceless works of art, including *Christ in the Storm on the Sea of Galilee*, the only seascape ever painted by Dutch artist Rembrandt van Rijn. In many cases, the frames from which these invaluable pieces were taken hang empty on the walls, a haunting reminder of how the whereabouts of these stolen works, precious to both museum-goers and the museum's creator herself, still remain a mystery. Over 33 years later, the \$10M reward being offered to anyone with information that could restore these works to their homes on the walls of the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum lies unclaimed.
