


Mysteries Around the World Book Group December 7th at 7 pm | The Stoneham Room







Christmas at Pemberley

The holiday season brings forth my love of all things Victorian. I am sure that in Charles Dickens' London things were not warm and cozy, but I like to imagine that at Christmas the gloom and stench lifted to reveal warm fires, parties, carols, and roast goose. Would I cook a goose today? No! But it sure sounds delightful when Scrooge has one brought to the Cratchit family table in *A Christmas Carol*. Reading this classic or watching the movie is a favorite holiday tradition of mine. Another fun tradition that I embrace is reading the works of authors who have poked their heads into the cupboards of Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice* in order to take the characters on Christmas journeys, to the delight of readers everywhere. Here are some fun Pemberley holiday reads and watches.

My top recommendation is *A Darcy Christmas* by Amanda Grange. Out of the three novellas contained therein, my favorite involves Darcy and old Scrooge himself. Next is *Pride*, *Prejudice*, *and Mistletoe* by Melissa De la Cruz, which is a modern update on Austen's novel, with Darcy being female and Bennett being male – fun! *Christmas at Pemberley* has been performed as a play in the area, but is also on DVD as part of a Hallmark three–set movie. Finally, I couldn't write about a *Pride and Prejudice* spin–off without mentioning *Death Comes to Pemberley* by P. D James. Yes, it is a murder mystery, but sometimes Christmas needs a little bit of darkness to make it merry and bright.

The candles are lit and the carriages are arriving. The house is decorated with greens and bows, and the tables are filled with delicious treats. The music is playing and the punch is being served. Sit yourself down with a cup of cocoa and a cookie, and enjoy the party. Happy holidays everyone!














One tune may call things out of the past; another may enable us to imagine things that are neither past nor present, but are scenes from the listener's mental film reel, so to speak. The latter case suggests that, while music is primarily an auditory experience, there seems to be a visual component as well. Perhaps the structure of musical compositions carries a "cinematic" quality, much like when we read a novel. This has become evident to me especially through listening to classical music, a genre that customarily relies less upon lyrics and more upon instrumental arrangement in order to convey the narrative, as with Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture, for instance. Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 is the strongest example that comes to my mind, particularly the tremolo violins that commence Movement I, which seem to imitate the angelic choir that sang moments before the Creation; and Movement III, whose opening measures are like morning sunlight filtering in between close-standing trees, and the string section's sweet swells stir up some poignant image - a reconciliation between estranged friends, or one of Proust's penetrating passages on art, memory, and life.

Like baseball in sports, so have I a soft spot for the guitar when it comes to music. As of late, I have succumbed to the infectious and seductive personality of the Spanish guitar, especially through the work of John Williams (the guitarist, not the composer). His renditions of such pieces as Isaac Albeniz' fiery, exotic Asturias (Leyenda), Francisco Tarrega's crowd-silencing Recuerdos de la Alhambra, and Domenico Scarlatti's spirited Sonata K. 380 are exceptional performances; the best of the best, in my opinion.
