





This is a monthly program for adults 18+ to come hang out and make a craft together. January's craft will be bullet journals! All supplies provided. Registration is required.




Mysteries Around the World Book Group January 4th at 7 pm | The Stoneham Room


Craft & Chat January 18th at 7 PM | The Stoneham Room





Join Avery Bondar for a ceramic earrings workshop, during which you will make your own pair of ceramic earrings! Registration is required, space is extremely limited.




MUSEUM PASSES

The Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame is located in Springfield, MA, and is dedicated to the history of basketball. This pass must be picked up at and returned to the library. It admits up to 3 adults and 3 children at the discounted rate of \$17 per adult, \$15 per senior and \$12 per youth (ages five to 15). Children under five are admitted free. This pass is not limited by date or time.


The **Museum of Science** in Boston is dedicated to promoting and educating visitors about science and technology. This pass is an e-voucher, which will be sent to your email. You can print it out or display it to admissions on your device. It admits up to four people at half off the regular admission price. 





STAFF REVIEWS

Start the Year with an Adventure Recommendation | Melissa Jackson

I enjoy a good adventure story, and credit my mother for starting me on the genre. I also discovered the works of Alexandre Dumas, venturing into the exciting world of *The Three Musketeers*, *The Count of Monte Cristo*, and *The Man in the Iron Mask*.



How to Read a Book | Mortimer J. Adler & Charles Van Doren Review | Matthew Sowyrda

There are times when, as readers, we seek ways that will make us better at reading. At the same time, if we read a certain kind of book, it may also improve our character. These notions, among others, were what drove educators Mortimer Adler and Charles Van Doren to write *How to Read a Book*. Published in 1940, it achieved bestseller status, was later revised in 1972, and continues to be read today.

The authors stress active, intelligent, and purposeful reading. What this means is to exert honest effort, as well as to be able to discern the value of what you are reading. You may come across a book that gives you trouble, whether it presents ideas that upset you (if it



was written by an author with whom you disagree), or, it is one that you are struggling to comprehend – a book of theology, a treatise in advanced trigonometry, a poetry collection. One of the major points the authors make is that, the more challenging a book is for you, the more it is calling for your attention. If you are patient and persistent, you will not be disappointed by the rewards you reap from your labors. Better yet, you can learn a lot about yourself and the world from reading mentally taxing material, more so than from "easy reads" and books by authors with whom you already agree.

Another important point is to treat a book as the middle ground in the relationship between author and reader. An author is someone who poses a question or problem, or has something to teach, and wants to communicate these ideas to the world. The "demanding" reader's job is to sit down with that book, and dig into its pages to discover the meaning that lies within by asking critical questions and taking notes. This becomes, in effect, a conversation between the author and the reader – even if the former is no longer living. Readers should be charitable, in that they refrain from criticism until they have understood the author's meaning.

These tools are just a few among many that are aimed at helping readers to grow intellectually and – in a sense – spiritually. This is a serious and practical must-read for those who feel that they are in need of a reading guide that will help them with their own reading abilities. To top it off, the book is appended with over 100 recommendations, as well as and exercises with which you can practice analytical reading skills. This book – like a stranger, as the saying goes – is a friend you haven't met yet.
