
Mysteries Around the World Book Group Thursday, February 1st at 7 pm | The Stoneham Room





This pass is an e-voucher, and admits up to 9 people for free. Please note that the ship and museum have different hours. For details, please visit the museum's website.





Demon Copperhead by Barbara Kingsolver Review | Melissa Jackson

I must have a thing for *David Copperfield*. *Demon Copperfield* by Barbara Kingsolver is the second adaptation I have read recently, and I have also seen the 2019 film remake, *The Personal History of David Copperfield*. I am not alone in enjoying this story.

Kingsolver's reimagining of the Dickens classic is a rollicking tale of a boy's journey from rags to riches to rags to... (you get it!)

won this year's Pulitzer prize for fiction! Kingsolver has found a perfect setting for our young lad Damon (nicknamed Demon) to start his life story: born in Virginia' coal country to an addict mom. Plucky, with a sass mouth and a warm heart, I am rooting for this kid from the first page. I cheer on the characters who surround Damon with kindness, who see his talent and intelligence, who offer nothing but their hearts. Damon in return holds on to their humanity like a candle in the darkest night of his childhood. When people who try to crush him come into the story, I am just enraged and can't wait until they get their comeuppance! Like journeying through the Appalachian mountains themselves, we travel through the hills and valleys of the young man's life; the safe and happy peak followed by something, or someone sending Damon back into the gully (oh no!).

Read *Demon Copperhead*, or *The Goldfinch* by Donna Tartt, a 2014 retelling of *David Copperfield* set in Manhattan and Las Vegas (also a Pulitzer prize winner, by the way!). Watch the movie, or just read the OG *David Copperfield* by Dickens – they are all fantastic!

Intruder in the Dust (1949) Review | Dave Huygens

Celebrating Black History Month, Stoneham Public Library will be presenting the 1949 film version of William Faulkner's acclaimed novel, *Intruder in the Dust*. The film is a crime



drama centering on Lucas Beauchamp, a proudly independent black farmer accused of murdering a local white man, Vinson Gowrie. While a lynch mob gathers, a lawyer, a couple of teenage boys, and an elderly lady attempt to prove Beauchamp's innocence.

Veteran MGM director Clarence Brown (born in Clinton, Massachusetts, but raised in Tennessee) asked his bosses to buy the Faulker novel for him as soon as he read it. Though it wasn't the usual MGM fare, Brown was a respected and successful director whose hits ranged from sophisticated romantic and historical dramas to family films. MGM paid \$50,000 for the property, and Brown was given the go-ahead to produce and direct on location in Faulkner's home town of Oxford, Mississippi.

As one of the lead actors, Brown chose Claude Jarman, Jr., who'd been discovered by him for *The Yearling* (1946) (special Academy Award). David Brian was borrowed from Warner Bros. to play the town lawyer. Character actress Elizabeth Patterson (*I Love Lucy*) was cast as elderly Miss Habersham. Will Geer (*The Waltons*) was given the role of the sheriff. And, as Lucas, Juano Hernandez was chosen for his first mainstream film role.

The film earned Hernandez a Golden Globe nomination for "New Star of the Year," and was listed by the New York Times as one of the best of the year. Faulkner said Hernandez was "a fine actor – and man, too, " and called the film "a fine job." Author Ralph Ellison (Invisible Man), in comparing Intruder in the Dust to three other race-related films that had been released in 1949 (Pinky, Lost Boundaries, and Home of the Brave), said that it was "the only film that could be shown in Harlem without arousing unintended laughter, for it is the only one of the four in which Negroes can make complete identification with their screen image."

Lovely War by Julie Berry Review | Anna Powers

Lovely War by Julie Berry managed to be a combination of all my favorite genres wrapped into one – romance, historical fiction, and Greek mythology. The story follows two couples' love stories in the midst of the Great War. I instantly became enthralled in this book because of its unique format; unlike any other historical romance I have read, it's told through the perspectives of famous Greek Mythology figures. Aphrodite recounts these turbulent and addictive love stories to Hephaestus and Ares, with the help of Hades and Apollo to explain the unfortunate circumstances for which she is on trial.



This book does a great job of telling war stories through people of different genders, races, ethnicities, and socioeconomic backgrounds. The first couple, James and Hazel, met right as James was leaving to fight in France. They have a challenging time being in the right place at the right time, and question if their innocent love can survive the devastating things that come with war. The second couple, Aubrey and Colette, meet while they are on base in France. What started as a friendship and mutual love of music soon blossomed into a longing romance between an African-American soldier and a refugee Belgian orphan. Both Aubrey and Colette not only experience the traumas of war but also face additional adversity as a mixed race couple during a time in which not many accepted them. Although different in many ways, both couples have an unshakeable love for their partners and are willing to jump over any hurdle to make that love last.

Although the mythological narratives appear to be random, I think that it does a fantastic job framing the greater themes within the mortals' stories – love, war, greed, and guilt. The book is categorized as Young Adult, but I believe this to be a timeless story that can be read by adults of all ages. This book is for you if you are looking to read about the lengths that love is willing to travel in times of tragedy, and learn that even the Goddess of Love herself sometimes cannot grapple with the twists and turns of an epic love story or two.

John Buchan The Thirty-Nine Steps

The 39 Steps | John Buchan

While on vacation in England, Scotsman Richard Hannay befriends an American journalist who tips him off about a secret organization that is plotting to assassinate a national leader. When the American is murdered, Hannay is charged with homicide and finds himself embroiled in a political intrigue that is beyond his ken. With no choice but to flee from the police, as well as from members of the ring of sinister spies, he races against time to expose the conspiracy as it looms over his conscience. This gripping cat-and-

mouse page-turner takes readers from the dark streets of London, through the Scottish Highlands, and down to the southern coast of England. Fans of *The Man Who Knew Too Much* (1934) and G. K. Chesterton's *The Man Who Was Thursday* are bound to enjoy this novel.

A Man Lay Dead | Ngaio Marsh

Nigel Bathgate's first weekend visit to a wealthy Englishman's luxurious estate proves to be a harrowing one. After his cousin is stabbed in the back with an ancient dagger during a party game, Scotland Yard's Chief Inspector Roderick Alleyn arrives to investigate the murder. Everyone is a suspect, and no one is allowed to leave the grounds until the crime has been solved. The manorial setting and intricate narrative will be familiar to readers of Agatha Christie's *The Mysterious Affair at Styles* and A. A. Milne's *The Red House Mystery*.





The Power and the Glory | Graham Greene

In the years following Mexico's Cristero War, during which Catholicism had been effaced from most of the country through the murder of clergy and destruction of churches, one priest has miraculously survived the onslaught. Hunted by the state militia, yet bound to fulfill his office, the priest goes from village to village in the hope of saving what souls he can while he lives, struggling to maintain what faith he has left, and trying to reconcile with his sins. In this heartrending and inspirational novel, Greene forces his characters

(and readers) to confront weighty questions of faith, free will, human frailty, and redemption.
