
MEET THE AUTHOR: SAM FARMER

Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore (1974)

Review | David Huygens

Martin Scorcese's fourth feature film, *Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore* (1974), is an anomaly in the director's career, focusing on a female main character. It's about what happens when a 1970s Socorro, Arizona housewife is suddenly widowed, and takes off across the Southwest with her young son (Alfred Lutter) to try to find a better life.

After several false starts, Alice finds a job as a lounge singer in Phoenix, and a new relationship that ultimately does bad. Escaping to Tucson, and with very little money left, she finds work as a waitress in a diner, and ends up bonding with the women she works with. There's also a local rancher who's interested in her, who may or may not be what she needs in her life at the moment.

Vincent Canby of *The New York Times* called the film a "fine, moving, frequently hilarious tale", and wrote that "the center of the movie and giving it a visible sensibility is Miss Burstyn, one of the few actresses at work today...who is able to seem appealing, tough, intelligent, funny, and bereft, all at approximately the same moment." Burstyn's performance won her the Academy Award for Best Actress.

The film was a commercial success, grossing \$21 million on a \$1.8 million budget. Kris Kristofferson plays Burstyn's love interest, with Diane Ladd (nominated for Best Supporting Actress), Harvey Keitel, Lane Bradbury, Valerie Curtin, Lelia Goldoni, Vic Tayback, Jodie Foster, Billy "Green" Bush, and Harry Northrup. Also nominated for an Academy Award was screenwriter Robert Getchell (*Bound For Glory*). The film was the basis for the long-running TV series, Alice.

Yours, Purple Gallinule by Ewa Chrusciel Review | Matthew Sowyrda

Ewa Chrusciel is a 21st Century poet, an author of several poetry collections, among which are *Of Annunciations, Contraband of Hoopoe*, and *Strata*; the rest are still in her native Polish tongue. Her latest work, *Yours, Purple Gallinule*, revolves around birds and madness. The speaker is a psychiatrist who attempts to diagnose her avian patients based on the behaviors and sounds that are unique to each kind. She finds it impossible, however, to "pigeonhole" the artful motions of these winged creatures using modern approaches to mental diagnosis, even with the help of the *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders* (2013).



Chrusciel has a poet's command of language. For example, "A poem is a ravenous flock of snow buntings, an apocalypse of the air ... you need to wrestle it like Jacob did the Angel. Its otherness will bless, and wound" (p. 16). In one sense, this describes the essence poetry, which, through its intensity of feeling, pours forth from and is received by the heart. In another, it encompasses the pleasure and the pain of those who are truly alive. It reminds me of Don Quixote – literature's beloved madman – who would writhe in his sleep, his mind twisting itself over some complex passage in a book he had just read.

The symbolism of birds is clear, and so is the reason why Chrusciel chose them as a subject. Because birds and humans are, in a way, both migratory species, many analogies can be made here. Chrusciel's birds serve as a metaphor for human beings, who cannot be reduced to a label based on a strict set of symptoms. They are like travelers who wander so often that those who prefer to stay at home are bothered by the constant movement of the other. Chrusciel shows how, in turn, they who are at home in this world, often brand these "strangers" – philosophers, mystics, poets, lovers, the religious – with the seal of madness, or, in some cases, of folly. Even the structure of these poems vacillate between verse and prose, as if they themselves cannot be pinned down to a certain form.

Chrusciel weaves together allusions to biblical figures, Plato's philosophy (especially from *Symposium* and *Phaedrus*), St. Hildegard's mysticism, and Bosch's artistry, as she treats of classical and modern views of mental illness, as well as the idea that the human person transcends the vanity of excessive mental diagnosis and convenient prescriptions.
