





HISTORY OF FEMINISM IN MUSIC WITH JOHN CLARK

Witness for the Prosecution (1957) Review | David Huygens

Highly suspenseful, with a generous sprinkling of sophisticated wit, *Witness for the Prosecution* (1957), based on the story by Agatha Christie, is one of writer-director Billy Wilder's best films.

Due to the nature of the tale, it is impossible to reveal too much about it here, beyond the bare



bones of the plot. Barrister Sir Wilfrid Robarts (Charles Laughton), who is recovering from a heart attack, agrees to defend charming, perpetually underemployed Leonard Vole (Tyrone Power) despite the objections of Robarts' doctor, who has warned him against taking any criminal cases and has assigned him a businesslike and hovering nurse (Elsa Lanchester).

Vole is accused of murdering Emily French (Norma Varden), a wealthy widow who had named him as the main beneficiary in her will. Circumstantial evidence strongly suggests Vole is the killer, but Sir Wilfrid believes him to be innocent. Vole's wife Christine (Marlene Dietrich) seems strangely detached, but does provide an alibi, albeit a not entirely convincing one. Sir Wilfred is greatly surprised when, during the trial, she is summoned as a witness by the prosecution.

As a narrator intones before the final fade-out, "The management of this theater suggests that, for the greater entertainment of your friends who have not yet seen the picture, you will not divulge to anyone the secret of the ending of *Witness for the Prosecution*." And we would not want to spoil your enjoyment of the film by revealing any more than we already have. This film is a real treat and the performances by Mr. Laughton and the rest of the cast are first rate.

The Hundred Loves of Juliet by Evelyn Skye Review | Melissa Jackson


One of my favorite movies is *Somewhere in Time* (1980). Christopher Reeves and Jane Seymour star in this epic romance about a young playwright who falls in love with the woman he sees in an 80 year old picture, hanging in the lobby of the hotel where he is staying. He is so enraptured with this woman that he actually finds a way to go back in time to find her. The movie is a real tear jerker and I loved it! The idea that love transcends time and that your true love can exist across time and space is a powerful one. It is a theme explored quite wonderfully in Evelyn Skye's novel, *The Hundred Loves of Juliet*.



Using a dual narrative quite successfully, we discover that Helene and Sebastien are in fact the reincarnation of Romeo and Juliet, and have run into each other again and again in other reincarnations – this time in Alaska. Helene has left a disastrous marriage and Sebastien is a crab fisherman. When Helene first encounters Sebastien, she is shocked to see the personification of the man she has imagined and written about since the 8th grade! How could her imaginary guy actually be here in person? When Sebastien sees Helene, he panics; Juliet has found him again! He must get away from her before the curse falls again, dooming her to die as all the other Juliets have. However, Helene has other ideas; she walks over and says, "I know you". In response, Sebastien is abominably rude. Will fate give them a break? Will these star-crossed lovers find a happy ending after all this time? Will the curse bring its awful fate? Find out in this terrific read!

The Homecoming by Andrew Pyper Review | Matthew Sowyrda

On the surface, Andrew Pyper's novel, *The Homecoming*, has a simple plot. Raymond Quinlan has just passed away, taking to the grave the vault of secrets that was his enigmatic existence. The surviving Quinlans are puzzled as to why they have been summoned to Belfountain, a heavily forested property, for the reading of the will. A shock comes to the family when the document's unorthodox demand is revealed: to inherit any money, they must remain on the premises for an entire month. Stalked by a monster in the woods, and plagued by the same cryptic dream, the Quinlans struggle to face their present situation, as well as their respective pasts. In time, they discover the truth about Belfountain, and why they are there.



Firstly, the pacing moves too quickly, which takes away from the brooding atmosphere and heightening suspense that are key elements in a story like this. The narration skips to another scene when a previous one was just developing. Pyper also explains too much to the reader, with regard to character motives. Similarly, he has a tendency to "tell" instead of "show" details, making it difficult for the reader to make inferences and visualize the world that the author has created. These problems contribute to shallow characters, which blunted the feel-good ending. Lastly, Pyper uses an excessive amount of what I can only call broken sentences, which cuts up the flow of thought. I would say that that kind of writing is better suited to verse than to prose.

I think the story is somewhat engaging, at least, up to a certain point. Although there are surprising "half-twists" and "full twists", the plot becomes convoluted. After a while, it takes on what seem to be elements of science fiction, as well as some of the outlandish motifs that characterize the stories of Stephen King, particularly the shared dream experience (*The Stand*). Overall, Pyper's style seems to be geared towards readers who like fast-paced, character-driven narratives with constant action.
